As 2025 draws to a close, we are pleased to present news and highlights from this year at the ACO. With your support and help, the ACO continues its central focus of training medical orgonomists, and studying and sustaining unarmored life and health as identified by Wilhelm Reich, M.D. In seminars, presentations, workshops, and discussion groups, the struggle of supporting health in individuals and society continues.

We've broadened our efforts to reach the public in new ways, ensuring the College's future, and continuing the journey of the study, understanding, and utilization of the science of orgonomy.

This past year has been one of meaningful transformation for the ACO, with every change made with a single purpose: to strengthen the College's foundation so that the science of orgonomy can continue and thrive for generations to come.

This year, the ACO's distinguished medical orgonomy training program continued to shine. Training seminars returned to campus, and our hybrid format is now stronger than ever, giving students the best of both worlds, online and in person. Having the training programs in person brings back the irreplaceable spark of face-to-face communication and learning, while remote participation ensures that doctors across the country and around the world can remain fully engaged and connected with their training.

As physician Christopher Burritt, D.O. shared, "My training with the ACO has given me a deeper understanding of people and their emotional lives and the ability to appreciate them for all that is healthy and unhealthy. It has allowed me to help them overcome problems that medicine has no effect on and find more satisfaction with life."

Our Social Orgonomy Training Program moved forward with renewed momentum. Tutorials, seminars, and individual presentations remain core to the curriculum and are now offered virtually, periodically in person, and in flexible hybrid form. After four years exclusively online, these mixed-format sessions bring a refreshing sense of connection, continuity, and community.

Our podcast series, A Different Kind of Psychiatry, hosted by Christopher Burritt, D.O. has continued to grow steadily and now reaches listeners worldwide, reflecting a rising public interest in orgonomy and its practical understanding of health and wellness. Each episode of the podcast brings orgonomy to life through patient stories, clinical insights, and reflections from our doctors, demonstrating clear, relatable ways that orgonomic knowledge understands and addresses real-world emotional struggles. We will continue to incorporate select case material, special topics, discussions and occasional guest insights. The

increasing listenership of these podcasts underscores their core value as an accessible resource for individuals seeking greater clarity regarding their emotional lives.

This year marked an exciting milestone with the release of newly produced ACO audiobooks. These books bring orgonomy to a broader audience by offering an accessible, immersive way to engage with foundational and contemporary orgonomic literature. Professionally narrated and thoughtfully produced, the audiobooks allow listeners to deepen their understanding while commuting, walking, or simply taking a quiet moment for themselves. Early feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, with appreciation expressed for the opportunity to experience original texts in a new format.

One long-time ACO supporter wrote, "Hearing these works which have been brought to life adds a new level of clarity and connection. It's a remarkable step forward for orgonomy's reach and impact." More audio books are in development, continuing our commitment to making orgonomic knowledge available in formats that suit today's learners.

The ACO has recently introduced a new Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system that allows better communication with members, donors and students. This vital upgrade strengthens how the ACO serves our public and ensures that, as we expand, our outreach remains personal, efficient and forward-looking.

In December of this year, we proudly launched our new website, designed to make information more accessible, engaging, and visually inviting. The website integrates with our new CRM system which helps people explore many aspects of orgonomy, register for courses, and stay connected with ACO news.
